On Monday, September 16, an explosion destroyed the LEAP building in Farmington on the Farmington Falls Road. An employee and several firefighters were critically injured, and one firefighter was tragically killed. There are many ways that you can respond to our local community after the explosion and the resulting devastation. If you would like to contribute financially, you may donate at Franklin Savings Bank in person or online via PayPal directly to the accounts (Firemen's Benevolent Association for the firefighters and first responders and the Disaster Relief Fund, dedicated to families and individuals who have been displaced or injured in the explosion) managed at Franklin Savings Bank here: https://www.franklinsavingsbank/special.html

You may also donate through United Way of the Tri Valley Area (electronically at https://www.uwtva.org or at their office located at 218 Fairbanks Road in Farmington) to the LEAP Explosion Fund to help LEAP employees, firefighters and others who were affected. There are also GoFundMe pages for raising funds for individuals including Larry Lord, who saved many lives by evacuating the people who were in the LEAP building just before the explosion.

There is a Facebook page created by our United Way of the Tri Valley Area office where one can share items that may benefit the impacted individuals. Do you have bedding to share? Food?

From The Moderator

Life can give you whiplash.

On Sunday, September 15, I drove up to Jackman for the Living Water Association's annual fall outdoor worship service, a tradition that was initiated a few years ago at Titcomb Mountain. First I got to see the lovely Moose River Congregational Church, which like our own church building is on the National Register of Historic Places. Then we went down to the basement for lunch, a happy, bustling affair during which I got to meet some of the 80 attendees from our eighteen association churches – for example, the sister of one local co-pastor (who also happened to be the lunch organizer), and the mother of the other local co-pastor. And then, best of all, we walked over to the Moose River itself for a moving outdoor worship service, graced by trees and water and sky and a campfire and, as an unplanned closing flourish, a swimming flock of ducks. It was a *wonderful* day.

The next day was anything but wonderful.

On Monday, September 16, Farmington's new L.E.A.P. building exploded, with one firefighter killed and several other people injured. That evening there were three vigils held by three churches, with people from the St. Joseph's vigil processing across town to join our own candlelight vigil. I don't think any of us realized just how many people would attend our vigil: the sanctuary was full and then some, with folks lined up against the wall. As the unofficial greeter directing newcomers to the sanctuary, I saw first-hand the wide range of people coming through our doors, the solemn faces, the tears shed, the churchgoers and the unchurched, the long-time residents and the UMF students, all needing a space to grieve our losses.

I'm not wise enough to grasp why life features both joy and pain. Instead I'll suggest that what linked these two events is our deep need for community. What made the day in Jackman special is that it was shared with others, some of whom I already knew and some I was meeting for the first time, all enjoying each other's company and all sharing delight in God's Creation at our riverside worship site. What made the night in Farmington bearable is that it was shared with others, that there was mutual support, that we had the comfort of sharing a space with others mourning the death and the injuries and the random incomprehensible tragedy. Both in joyful times and in painful times, life is best when we open our hearts and live it together.

And here's a related link: stepping in to lead our vigil, and to offer pastoral care to our town in the days that followed, were four Maine UCC ministers, three of them from the Living Water Association. You just never know when you'll need your community to be there for you.

In Maine, in the Living Water Association, in Farmington, and in our Old South congregation, we have each other to share the good and the bad. Thanks be to God for that.

On the evening of September 16th, the day of the explosion, Old South held a silent candle-lit vigil. Retired Reverend Margaret Proctor of Wilton was here to give a moving prayer. On the two days after the explosion, Old South opened its doors to anybody in the community who would like to talk or pray about the week's events. On the first day, Pastor Heather Sylvester was here, having driven down from The Forks so that she could be available to our community for pastoral care. On the second day, Reverend Chrissy Cataldo came from the Winthrop First Congregational Church UCC also to offer pastoral care.

The Deacons would like to offer a huge "Thank You!" to these caring and generous pastors!

Another "thank you" goes out to our photographer, Gil Riley, who took a group photo of the deacons this month. Thanks to Gil, I can now introduce our new Diaconate Team with faces to go with their names! Many large corporations—like Hershey's, Mars, Nestle, and Russell Stover—profit indirectly from forced child labor in West Africa, where 70% of the world's cocoa is grown.)


Children and Youth
